	the pandemic.
	 Next week will be <u>Mom's Meals</u> final week at providing frozen meals at Westminster Overlook apartments.
	They have distributed over 3,000 meals since end of July.
	• Since July the senior centers have been providing virtual fitness classes. They have served between 160-165
	people and provided 250 sessions.
	<u>Drive and Go Flu Shot Clinic</u> provided over 200 shots.
	 No word from the Governor regarding <u>reopening the senior centers</u> but they have begun planning for that
	occurrence. When they do reopen there will be restrictions in place. They have already begun creatively
	looking at their programming and developing a hybrid plan for classes.
	<u>SIP funding</u> had been reduced at the start of the pandemic due to being closed. Since July they have been
	able to provide 1,100 individual sessions. Since September they have welcomed three new clients.

	 Senior Assisted Living Subsidy has increased their funding to \$1,000/month. Asset and income limits have also increased. Two new facilities will be added to participating locations once all the paperwork is signed. Their audit went well. Staff has contacted clients from Senior Care via telephone. They have been able to move some clients from the waiting list. Extra funding has been provided to the <u>Caregiver program</u> via the CARES Act. This has been used to provide smart TV's, Chrome books, technology items, groceries and childcare costs. Mary Jane Overby, the Caregiver Program Coordinator, has been trained to lead Powerful Tools of Caregivers. A virtual series has been scheduled for January 2021. Medicare Part D Open Enrollment is underway and has been going smoothly. They are providing telephone appointment and one volunteer comes into BOAD once a week to answer calls. <u>State Health Insurance Assistance Program</u> is also conducting virtual Medicare 101 and 102 workshops in partnership with Carroll County Public Library. Carroll County's Census goal was to reach a response rate at or better than our 2010 response rate, even during a pandemic. Our 2010 response rate was 83%. As of October 13, 2020, Carroll County has a self-response rate of 81.5%. This does not include counts that enumerators have done nor the group quarters. This percentage keeps us as the top county in Maryland as well as 24 th in the United States out of over
New Business – Jim McCarron	 <u>Election of 2021 Chair and Vice-Chair – Leslie Wagner</u>. All members attending were forwarded a live link for an online ballot. After voting, Jim McCarron was elected as Chair and Carol Wheatley as Vice-Chair. These appointments will begin January 1, 2021. <u>Rec & Parks Update – Jeff Degitz</u> Their Advisory Board is updating their Strategic Plan, which happens every three years. • Piney Run holds a yearlong Biggest Fish Contest for a prize of \$1,000. The current leader caught a 35-inch
striped bass last month. Dan Bowler remarked that Carroll County's park system has been a huge blessing for
those with intellectual disabilities during the pandemic.
Open Commission Positions – Leslie Wagner. Current open positions include an adult with a disability or a
representative of adult with a disability and an individual with intellectual disability. Larry Burbank's final term ends
on December 31 st so effective January 1, 2021 the position representing Veterans will be open. Larry is to be
commended for serving on the COAD for 12 years – six as a representative of Manchester and six as a representative
of Veterans.
Additional By-Law Revisions – Leslie Wagner. Article IV (Appointment and Terms of Members) Section 4 was revised
to remove language that would have all terms begin on January 1, staggered so that five members' terms end every
year and the inclusion of the current roster as Exhibit A. Per the By-Laws, an affirmative vote of three-quarter of the
voting membership is needed to make changes to the By-Laws. With 11 voting members present and the vote was
unanimous, this was accomplished.
